Prevent - Latest Update

I have written to you previously about how schools are now required to talk to pupils about radicalisation and extremism as part of the <u>Prevent Duty.</u> After speaking to the children about Rapunzel and Mother Gothel's extreme views on looking after her, we recently talked about football fans and the extreme way that some people choose to support their teams. Again, the idea is to teach the children that some people have extreme and radical views about how to do things and that we need to recognise these. Prevent update

Prevent is about safeguarding people and communities from the threat of terrorism. Prevent is 1 of the 4 elements of CONTEST, the Government's counter-terrorism strategy. It aims to stop people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism. Radicalisation by extremist groups or individuals can be perpetrated via a number of means: face-to-face by peers, in organised groups in the community and, increasingly, online. Their targets are individuals or groups of people who can be easily led towards terrorist ideologies because of their experiences, state of mind or sometimes their upbringing. However extremists attempt to influence vulnerable people, the internet invariably plays some kind of role, being widely used both to create initial interest, and as reinforcement to other means of communication. As is the case with everything it is used for, the internet enables considerably larger numbers of people to be reached, in a wider geographic area, and with less effort by the perpetrators. The power of social media is well-known, and it is this that is the main channel for such grooming – be it Facebook, Twitter or the multitude of other sites and apps. Other online channels include chatrooms, forums, instant messages and texts. All are also used by extremists for their day-to-day communication, as is the dark web.
